PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

History: intermittent vomiting and diarrhea for the last year, eating and drinking normal . owner is feeding him cooked veal, he is not eating dog food

Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: cbc,chem , fecal : pending

ULTRASONOGRAPHIC EXAMINATION OF THE ABDOMEN

Urinary System

The **urinary bladder**, trigone, and pelvic urethra presented normal thicknesses and normal tone. The ureters were not visible which is normal. No uroliths or sediment were visualized and anechoic urine was present. No evidence of inflammatory or neoplastic changes were noted. Ureteral papillae were normal.

The **prostate** was uniformly enlarged with lobar swelling appeared to impinge upon the urethra and mildly deviate the descending colon. The prostatic tissue was hyperechoic containing focal areas of decreased echogenicity. These changes are minor and suggestive of either chronic inflammatory episodes, benign cystic pathology or both. Underlying neoplasia cannot be completely ruled-out but is lower on the differential list. This presentation is most consistent with benign prostatic hyperplasia with possible active prostatitis. Neutering or off-label Finasteride (Propecia) (0.1-0.5 mg/kg Sid) treatment is indicated +/- FNA or prostatic wash cytology and culture. The prostate measured 2.07 cm.

The **kidneys** revealed normal size and structure, corticomedullary definition and ratio for this age. The cortices presented largely uniform texture with normal echogenic relationship to liver and spleen. Medullary structure differed distinctly from the cortex and no evidence of pelvic dilation was present. The capsules were acceptably uniform without significant irregularities. The left kidney measured 3.87 cm. The right kidney measured 4.29 cm.

Adrenal Glands

The **left adrenal gland** was visualized and recognized as having normal shape, size, position and echogenicity for this breed. The phrenic vasculature, glandular echogenicity and detail were unremarkable. Capsule, cortex, and medullary definition were normal for this age patient. The left adrenal gland measured 0.23 cm.

The **right adrenal gland** was not visualized.

Spleen

The **spleen** was unremarkable, however, obscured by artifact.

Liver

The **liver** images submitted revealed subjectively normal liver size, contour, and structure. Parenchymal echogenicity was naturally coarse and hypoechoic to the spleen. Vascular and biliary tracts were of normal volume with no evidence of congestion. The gallbladder presented acceptably thin walls with primarily anechoic content. The cystic and common bile ducts were normal. No pathological hepatic lymphadenopathy was evident. No overt structural evidence of inflammatory, infiltrative or regenerative pathology was evident.

Gastrointestinal



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The upper **gastrointestinal tract** in this patient revealed minor, edematous wall. There was no evidence of foreign bodies. Minor areas of fluctuant fluid accumulation were noted within the lumen with hyperperistalsis. This pattern continued to the ileocecal valve. The colon revealed a fluid filled lumen. This presentation is most consistent with gastrointestinal irritation/inflammation without obstruction. The gastric wall measured 0.25 cm.

Pancreas

The base and limbs of the **pancreas** were observed to be largely isoechoic to surrounding omental fat. Pancreatic duct and capsular contour were acceptably normal and parenchyma respected normal curvilinear patterns. No overt evidence of active inflammatory or neoplastic disease was noted.

ULTRASONOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

- Gastroenteritis presentation
- Minor BPH prostate
- The spleen was obscured by artifact

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

No evidence of foreign body. Supportive care for GI insult should prove effective.
