PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

went for a fight with other cat , opened wound oozing pus at the front right paw, vomited once and has loose stool , diagnosed recently with Tritrichomonas fecalis.
Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: bloody discharge from the front right paw , favoring this leg , blood work hyperglycemia , elevated phosph. ,

RADIOGRAPH OF THE FORE PAWS

2x the same image of lateral foreleg from mid-humerus to digits 2

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

Skeletal immaturity compatible with the given age is noted.

The skin surfaces appear to be smooth.

The bones are well mineralized, have a normal trabecular structure and smooth, continuous surfaces. Cortical-medullary development and differentiation of the long bones are physiological.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- I can see no obvious pathology

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

All bony surfaces appear smooth, and a soft tissue swelling is not obvious. I can see no broken off tooth in the soft tissues. A swab should be taken for bacteriology and antibiotic treatment initiated as it is most likely a cat bite rather than an abscess due to a foreign body. However, if the clinical signs do not completely disappear, obtaining a DP view is recommended.
