**PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS**

Patient had an incomplete mastectomy, diagnosed with mammary adenocarcinoma. History of a decreased appetite and some tenesmus for 5 days. 2 Enemas were performed with minimal bowel movement following. Patient still has a decreased appetite.

**RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN**

Single right lateral view dated 9/29/21 and right/left lateral and ventrodorsal views totaling 3 images dated 10/4/21 available for review.

**BREED**

Domestic Shorthair

**RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS**

There is mild lumbosacral spondylosis. Moderate to severe spondyloses are seen throughout the thoracic and lumbar spine.

**SEX**

Female Spayed

Mild soft tissue swelling appears to be present level with the caudal mammary complexes. There appears to be mild soft tissue swelling in the inguinal area as well.

The urinary bladder is moderately distended. No abnormal opacities are seen throughout the urinary bladder.

**AGE**

The small intestinal loops are evenly distributed throughout the mid abdomen without evidence of abnormal dilation.

The descending colon contains a moderate amount of inspissated fecal material. No evidence of deviation or stenosis is seen.

There is no radiographic evidence of sublumbar soft tissue swelling.

The radiographic presentation of the liver, kidneys, spleen, and stomach is within normal limits.

**RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS**

- Mild constipation of the descending colon.
- No evidence of extraluminal or mural stenosis of the colon.
- No radiographic evidence of sublumbar lymphadenomegaly.

**INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS**

There is no radiographic evidence of sublumbar lymphadenomegaly. Mild lymph node enlargement cannot be ruled out entirely; however, there appears to be no mass effect onto the colon. The reason for the constipation may be dehydration of the patient. An overt cause for the tenesmus other than the constipation cannot be identified radiographically.
