 Quinn started vomiting last night and it was just the one time. Vomited mid-air while jumping. When Theresa woke up this morning there was 7-9 piles of vomit around the house. It started out with food but then turned to white foam bile.

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

BREED

Right/left lateral and ventrodorsal views totaling 3 images available for review.

Domestic Short Hair

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

SEX

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

Spayed

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

AGE

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

4 Years, 10 Months

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic tail is not seen.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

HOSPITAL NAME

The stomach is empty except for a mild amount of gas.

The small intestinal loops are evenly distributed throughout the mid abdomen. A mild segmental gas pattern is noted. There is no evidence of abnormal dilation or plication.

The descending colon contains moderately inspissated fecal matter.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The radiographic study reveals no direct signs of mechanical ileus. No plication or abnormal dilation is noted and there is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material. Subileus cannot be ruled out and linear foreign material may be radiographically occult. Hence, further definition by means of abdominal ultrasound should be considered in case of persisting clinical signs.
