Reason for Visit: CONSTIPATION History: P IS HERE FOR CONSTIPATION , O SAID P WAS CONSTIPATED IN OCTOBER LAST YEAR AND P STAYED IN THE HOSPITAL FOR A FEW DAYS AND P WAS GIVEN AN ENEMA, SINCE TEUSDAY P BEEN CONSTIPATED, O NOTICED NOT HAVING A REGULAR BOWEL MOVEMENT, O BELIVES IT COULD BE BECAUSE OF THE SWITCH IN CANNED FOOD, P NORMALLY GETS TUNEA/CHICKEN FLAKES FANCY FEIST BUT O WAS UNABLE TO FIND THE FOOD IN STORES OR ONLINE, O GAVE A LAXATIVE(METAMUCIL) WED, THURS, FRIDAY, O NOTICED A LITTLE BIT OF BOWEL MOVEMENT, P IS STRAINING TO DEFICATE, P ISN'T DRINKING MUCH WATER, O HASN'T SEEN MUCH URINE, CHECK IF WE'RE BLOCKED? Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: Hydration: Appropriately hydrated Mentation: BAR, growling, hissing, snapping EENT: No nasal discharge; clear no discharge OU; clean no exudate AU; No cough on tracheal palpation. Oral Cavity: No dental tartar present Lymph Nodes: did not palpate Skin: Good hair coat, no signs of ectoparasites. No lesions noted. CV/Respiratory: No murmur or crackles/wheezing auscultated. Normal bronchovesicular sounds. Abd/GI: Soft abdomen - P growling during palpation - P too large to feel colon or bladder consistently Uro/Perineum: N Musculoskeletal: Ambulatory x4, no lameness noted. BCS 9/9 Neurological: Appropriate

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The patient is obese.

The abdominal serosal detail is good.

The liver, kidneys, and urinary bladder present within the expected limits.

The ascending, transverse, and descending colon contain a large amount of fecal matter which appears to be inspissated. No evidence of narrowing of the pelvic canal is noted.

The physéal scars and the proximal femur are prominently seen on both sides.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- Constipation of the colon.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The radiographic study reveals constipation of the colon with a large amount of inspissated fecal matter. No evidence of mechanical stenosis of the pelvic canal is seen. Dietary, inflammatory, infectious, and behavioral causes are to be considered.
