Binx Daguilar is a 4-year-old neutered male Oriental Shorthair presented for vomiting. As per the owner's statements: - vomited 16-20 times since last two days - Vomits every time he has a BM - He has no appetite On PXE BAR dehydrated 6-7% Abdominal palpation was unremarkable Bloodwork was unremarkable

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

Right/left lateral and ventrodorsal views totaling 3 images available for review.

BREED

Oriental Shorthair

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

SEX

Neutered Male

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

AGE

4

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic tail is not seen.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

The stomach is empty.

The small intestine presents a gas pattern. The small intestinal loops are turgid in appearance with occasional corrugation. There is no radiographic evidence of plication, abnormal dilation, or radiopaque foreign material.

The colon is mostly empty.

The radiographic study reveals no typical signs of obstructive ileus. The radiographic findings support presence of a functional intestinal ileus. Further definition by means of abdominal ultrasound is recommended in this patient especially in case the clinical signs persist. In other words, should the patient remain unresponsive to the initiated treatment and supportive care.
