PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

During most recent exam, owner noted two cases of ataxia, once in October and once in January. Upon receiving bloodwork, informed owner this may have been due to the increased urea shown. Bloodwork also revealed pancreatitis as well as a degree of kidney failure. Xray performed to also look for bladder stones.

Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: Bloodwork attached. Diagnosed with Pancreatitis as well as a degree of kidney failure.

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

Right/left lateral and dorsoventral views of the abdomen totaling 4 images available for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The patient is in thin body condition.

Mild generalized osteopenia is seen.

The urinary bladder is distended. No evidence of abnormal opacities is noted within the urinary bladder.

The assessment of the kidneys is limited due to superimposition with the gastrointestinal tract. Both kidneys appear to be relatively small in size with slightly irregular margination. The general shape of the kidneys appears to be maintained. No abnormal opacities are seen.

The gastrointestinal tract is postprandial.

The liver presents within normal radiographic limits.

The abdominal serosal detail appears to be maintained.

A series of spondyloses are seen between T6 and T10.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- Normal radiographic presentation of the abdomen.
- Suspect small size of the kidneys: potential for chronic renal disease, no evidence of radiopaque calculi.
- Thin body condition
- Presumably age related osteopenia.
- Spondyloses T6-T10

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The radiographic presentation of the abdomen is within normal limits.

Reduced renal size/ chronic nephropathy cannot be ruled out. However, the radiographic assessment of which is limited. No evidence of radiopaque renal or urinary bladder calculi was seen.
