streaks of blood and mucous coming with formed stool one week ago everything else normal
Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: mild abdominal discomfort during palpation bloodwork indicated high level of cpli and elevated ALP rest within range

Right lateral and ventrodorsal views totaling 2 images available for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The patient is obese.

A soft tissue opaque subcutaneous nodule is seen in the dorsum level with the 6th lumbar vertebra and measures approximately 1.0 cm in diameter.

SEX

Female Spayed

The abdominal serosal detail is within normal limits.

The radiographic presentation of the liver and kidneys is within normal age related limits.

AGE

10 Years

The stomach contains a mild amount of food.

The small intestinal loops are evenly distributed throughout the mid abdomen. The cecum contains gas and is seen ventral to the mid lumbar spine.

The descending colon contains a mild amount formed fecal material and gas. There is no mass seen throughout the visible large intestine. No evidence of dilation of the descending colon or rectum is noted and there is no radiographic evidence of sublumbar lymphadenomegaly.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

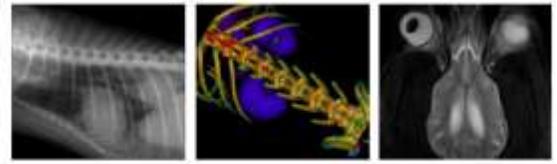
The radiographic assessment of the large intestine is limited however, as far as assessable, there is no evidence of a mass lesion, deviation, abnormal dilation, or stenosis of the descending duodenum and rectum seen. The most caudal aspect of the rectum and anal sphincter are not included in this study. Correlate with the clinical palpation and consider ultrasound versus endoscopy for further definition depending on the clinical presentation if indicated.
