PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

loss of appetite/ nausea /inappropriate urination on bed . slightly pale . blood work is pending.

SPECIES

Feline

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

Right/left lateral and ventrodorsal views of the abdomen totaling 4 images available for review.

BREED

Domestic Shorthair

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The tail is amputated in this cat.

SEX

Neutered Male

An ovoid soft tissue opacity ventral to the caudal abdomen is seen.

Severe degenerative lumbosacral stenosis with moderate intervertebral disc space collapse, spondylosis deformans, step formation, and vertebral end plate sclerosis are seen.

AGE

14 Years

L4/5 spondylosis deformans is noted.

The urinary bladder is moderate distended. No abnormal opacities are seen associated with the urinary bladder.

The gallbladder appears to be distended.

Small intestinal aerophagia with subjectively thickened appearance of the small intestinal wall is noted.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- Apparent history of tail amputation.
- Degenerative lumbosacral stenosis.
- L4/5 spondylosis deformans.
- Suspect inguinal lymphadenomegaly.
- Small intestinal aerophagia/functional ileus
- Distended gallbladder otherwise normal radiographic presentation of the abdomen.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The urinary bladder is moderate distended. No radiopaque calculi are seen within the urinary bladder. Full urinalysis, however, should be performed if not done so already. Neurologic causes of disturbed micturition / “inappropriate urination” should be ruled out owing to the obvious prior injury of the tail and presence of degenerative lumbosacral stenosis.
