**PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS**

Intermittent trouble rising from a laying position for the past month. Left rear leg injury sustained as a puppy - leg was stuck in a bed frame and he was significantly lame for several weeks.

**SPECIES**

Canine

**RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS**

Pelvis/coxofemoral joints:

**BREED**

Fox Terrier Mix

The bony structures of the pelvis and the sacroiliac joints are unremarkable. There is no evidence of a lytic process noted.

**SEX**

Neutered Male

Coxofemoral joints are inconspicuous. There is no relevant formation of osteophytes recognized. Femoral head/neck formations are unremarkable with a congruent joint space. There are no signs of a lytic or sclerotic process. There is no evidence of a fracture or subluxation. Musculature of the left thigh presents small gas pockets.

**AGE**

2 Years

Stifles:

Both stifles present regular findings without relevant formation of osteophytes. Bony structures are unremarkable without signs of a lytic or sclerotic process. Subchondral surfaces are smooth. Intraarticular fat body is inconspicuous, there is no evidence of a relevant joint effusion. Patella and patellar ligament present as expected. No evidence of a fracture and/or sub-/luxation is recognized. Sesamoid bones are bilaterally unremarkable. Periarticular soft tissues look normal. The middle section of the right tibia shows a small/focal increase of the medullary bone density.

**RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS**

- Questionable gas pockets left musculature of the thigh
- Focal increase of the medullary bone right tibia

**INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS**

Radiographic findings of the right tibia may be incidental and could represent a residual inflammatory process as seen with panosteitis/osteomyelitis. Common differentials are hematogenous infectious disease and bone infarcts after trauma. This finding must be correlated with the clinical presentation (local pain?).

The small gas pockets may represent an artificial finding due to superimposition and/or intramuscular injection. Abscess formation is unlikely and should reveal swelling/local pain of the left thigh.

Lesions of muscles/tendons/ligaments or inflammatory changes of the soft tissues cannot be fully excluded.
