PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Blood in urine

SPECIES

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

Displayed bony structures of spine and thorax are within normal limits without signs of a fracture, sub-/luxation and/or a lytic/sclerotic process. There is moderate and bilateral coxarthrosis noted.

BREED

Thorax:

The cardiac silhouette is normal with no evidence of chamber enlargement.

SEX

Male

Lung shows regular density, no evidence of focal/nodular lesions.

Trachea is unremarkable in diameter and course.

AGE

The carina and the bronchial tree appear normal.

Mediastinum presents expected soft tissue density, there is no evidence of tracheobronchial, cranial mediastinal or sternal lymphadenopathy. No mediastinal shift is seen.

Esophagus is not visible and considered to be normal.

Diaphragm is unremarkable, no signs of pleural effusion.

Liver and spleen present as expected and are well defined.

Stomach and intestine are unremarkable, predominantly empty with some gas filling of stomach and small intestine.

Large intestine shows some radiopaque ingesta.

Both kidneys are not well visualized but considered as normal.

INVOICE

No signs of abdominal or retroperitoneal effusion.

Urinary bladder is mildly filled presenting multiple, rounded radiopaque cystic calculi with a maximum estimated diameter of 3.6 mm. Prostate is not visualized. Urethra, intra- and post-pelvic soft tissues are as far as can be assessed inconspicuous without signs of radiopaque calculi especially in the course of the urethra passing the caudal flexure and penis.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

Radiographs present a mildly filled urinary bladder and is currently not suspicious for an obstructive lesion. Cystitis due to calculi is likely. The type of the calculi cannot be finally determined by radiographs. The rounded opacities could represent calcium phosphate. However, opacities may represent clusters of sediment as well. Urinary testing (sediment/culture) is recommended.
