PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

12/13/21 dog presented for breathing fast, scratching neck, throwing head backwards for 2 wks.
1/10/22 dog presented with no improvement: trouble with throat, throwing head back & now occasional vomiting yellow liquid (not food) & still breathing fast. Dog drinks & coughs.

SPECIES

Canine

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE NECK & THORAX

A complete set of radiographs of the neck and thorax is provided for review.

BREED

Golden Retriever

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

Neck

The larynx is aerated and presents without abnormalities.

SEX

Female Spayed

The osseous and soft tissue structures of the neck present without abnormalities.

The trachea has its anticipated course with smooth luminal outline and normal diameter.

AGE

1 Years, 10 Months

Thorax

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

The extrathoracic soft tissues present homogeneous without abnormalities.

The heart is of normal size and shape, there is no evidence of cardiac chamber or vascular enlargement. The pulmonary vasculature is within normal limits.

HOSPITAL NAME

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The cranial mediastinum presents the expected soft tissue opacity. The mediastinal width is less than twice the width of the vertebral column at the same level.

The trachea is normal in diameter and presents the anticipated course. The luminal outline of the trachea is smooth.

The bronchial tree presents with thin walls and tapers uniformly towards the periphery as expected.

The lung parenchyma presents the expected architecture and opacity; the intrapulmonary vascular branching is seen up to the third order lung vessels.

The diaphragm is well delineated with even surface and the expected mild cranial bulging of the diaphragmatic cupola.
