PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Consistent right forelimb lameness - Limp after running/playing hard, ever since he was a puppy. Limp takes about a half day to resolve, always seems to walk funny, but is very prominent PWB lameness on right forelimb after activity.

SPECIES

Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: Pet is incredibly difficult to examine awake - very mouthy/biting and doesn't like being touched by strangers. He reacts to elbow palpation more than shoulders, but couldn't tell if it was behavioral. He will not let me touch anywhere distal to the elbows without biting.

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE SHOULDER AND ELBOW JOINTS

A complete set of radiographs of the shoulder and elbow joints is provided for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

Both shoulder joints present smooth osseous margins and the surrounding soft tissue structures are within normal limits.

The periarticular bones of the right shoulder joint present smooth osseous margins, the contour of the medial coronoid process of the right elbow joint is well-defined and has a homogeneous density.

AGE

10 Months

The proximal contour of the anconeal process of the left elbow joint presents with a double contour and mild osteophyte formation is seen at the cranioproximal margin of the proximal epiphysis of the radius. In comparison to the right elbow joint, the tip of cranial tip of the contour of the medial coronoid process of the left elbow joint is indistinct.

- Normal shoulder joints
- Normal right elbow joint

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The radiographic study is suggestive for left sided coronoid disease ± mild degenerative osteoarthritis. The findings appear to be contrary to the clinical findings. However, a CT study of the elbow joints can be used for further workup.
