PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Ate a rubber band yesterday, and vomited 4 times, need to rule out partial obstruction or any abnormality

SPECIES

Canine

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

BREED

Havanese

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The right transverse process of L7 presents a prominent distal tip due to solid osseous remodeling.

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

SEX

Male Neutered

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

AGE

20 Months

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic body and tail are considered normal for position, size, shape and opacity.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

The stomach is in its anticipated position and empty.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

The colon is seen in the expected position and is empty.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- Empty gastrointestinal tract
- Malformed distal aspect right transverse process L7 – possible secondary to trauma or exostosis formation

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. The empty gastroenteritis might be a sequela to underlying gastroenteritis. If clinical signs are refractory to therapy, recommend follow up radiographs or a complete abdominal ultrasound examination; in some cases a high ileus may lack classical radiographic signs of mechanical obstruction.
