**PATIENT** Moora Korzims kaya History: vomiting 3x today, just bile. Yesterday more than 6 times. Vomited every time she ate food. No string under tongue. X-ray shows only bladder stones and unsure if there's any hairballs or minor obstructions

**RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN**

Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

**RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS**

**SEX**

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

Spayed Female

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

**AGE**

6 Years

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic body and tail are considered normal for position, size, shape and opacity.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position; a well-defined, ovoid shaped mineral opaque body is superimposed on the cranial pole of the urinary bladder in the lateral projection and caudal aspect of the urinary bladder – superimposed with the left transverse process – in the VD projection.

**HOSPITAL NAME**

The stomach is in its anticipated position and presents normal content.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. Recommend empirical management. If clinical signs are refractory to therapy, consider follow up or an abdominal ultrasound examination; in some cases a high ileus can lack classical radiographic signs of mechanical obstruction.
