PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Intermittent lameness left thoracic limb

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE CERVICAL SPINE AND LEFT FRONT LIMB

A lateral projection of the cervical spine and an overview study of the left front limb in two orthogonal imaging planes is provided for review.

BREED

Shih tzu/Poodle

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The intervertebral disc space C5/C6 is narrowed.

The osseous margins of the left shoulder joint are smooth, and no abnormalities of the surrounding soft tissue structures are appreciated.

SEX

MN

At the proximal aspect of the anconeal process of the left elbow joint and the medial aspect of the left humeral condyle, moderate osteophyte new bone formation is appreciated.

The left carpal joint – including the front paw – presents without abnormalities of the osseous and surrounding soft tissue structures.

- Degenerative osteoarthritis left elbow joint
- Suspect discopathy C5/C6
- Normal left shoulder joint
- Normal left carpal joint

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The degenerative joint disease of the left elbow joint can be a source for intermittent lameness – e.g. acute on chronic disease. Check if pain can be elicited on manipulation of the left elbow joint.

The narrowed intervertebral disc space C5/C6 is suggestive for discopathy that might or might not be associated with compressive myelopathy as source for pain.
