Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

SEX

FS

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

AGE

4 Years, 6 Months

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. At least 6 irregular marginated, mineral opaque calculi are superimposed on the urinary bladder, measuring up to 4 mm in size.

The stomach is in its anticipated position and presents normal content.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

The colon is seen in the expected position and presents with appropriate content.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The cystolithiasis is a plausible source for the presenting clinical signs/trigger for recurrent cystitis. If not done so yet, recommend complementing workup by a complete urinalysis. Surgical management is considered as the preferred treatment option.
