



PATIENT PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Wiley Toren Megas brought records from AESC for Monkey who was diagnosed with Pancreatitis yesterday. Both cats have the same symptoms. Wiley isn't eating and is lethargic which is very unusual for him. Megas believes that Wiley is nauseous. Megas said that Monkey started having these symptoms on Thursday night, but Megas thinks Wiley might have been having symptoms longer. Wiley hasn't been getting out of his bed. Megas believes Wiley has diarrhea.

SPECIES Feline Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: SLIGHT DEHYDRATION abdomen - UNCOMFORTABLE TO PALPATION, STOMATITIS, TARTAR

BREED RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

Siamese Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

SEX The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

MN No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

AGE The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

3 Years, 2 Months The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

INTERPRETED BY The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity.

Sebastian Schaub, DVM Dr. med. vet. DipECVDI Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

HOSPITAL NAME The stomach is in its anticipated position and is empty.

Elizabeth Animal Hospital The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and contain a mild amount of gas and fluid.

REFERRING VET The colon is seen in the expected position and mild to moderately distended by gas and a mild amount of unformed fecal material.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- Gas distended colon with unformed fecal material
- Mild gas & fluid pattern small intestinal tract
- Empty stomach

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INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The pattern of the gastrointestinal tract is suggestive for gastroenteritis or can be a sequela to pancreatitis, cholangiohepatitis, triaditis, other. There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. If not done so yet, complementing workup by complete blood work is recommended, including fpl. If clinical signs are refractory to therapy, recommend a complete abdominal ultrasound examination.
