Zeus Brantley History: Vomiting and blood in stool. Lethargic, not eating and drinking very little. Has meningitis and is being treated for it. He's been good for 2 years. Can look like this but not as bad with meningitis. Owner is watching her sister's dog. Aggressively licking her dog's back end. Only change.

SPECIES

Canine Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: Oral: COOL TEMP MODERATE PTYALISM WITH GASTRIC ODOR. Hydration: MILD DEHYDRATION. Mucous membranes: MILD DEHYDRATION

BREED RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

Blue Heeler Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

SEX RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

Male The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

AGE The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

2 Years 11 Months The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

INTERPRETED BY

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic body and tail are considered normal for position, size, shape and opacity.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

HOSPITAL NAME

The stomach is in its anticipated position and is empty.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas and foamy material is seen within the small intestinal loops.

REFERRING VET

The colon is seen in the expected position and empty but a small amount of gas and appears adynamic.

The radiographic findings in combination with the presenting clinical signs are highly suggestive for gastroenteritis. There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. If clinical signs are refractory to therapy, recommend follow up radiographs or a complete abdominal ultrasound examination; in some cases, a high ileus may lack classical radiographic signs of mechanical obstruction.
