PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Pt has persistent upper respiratory sounds.

Minimal improvement on antibiotics and steroids

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE SKULL, NECK, THORAX AND ABDOMEN

A complete set of radiographs of the skull, neck, thorax and abdomen is provided for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

Skull & Neck

Multiple teeth are absent.

The right nasal cavity presents a diffuse increased soft tissue opacification.

The external ear canals are aerated.

No additional abnormalities of the osseous and soft tissue structures of the skull.

An endotracheal tube is present in the cervical tracheal segment. The osseous and soft tissue structures of the neck reveal no abnormalities.

Thorax

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

The extrathoracic soft tissues present homogeneous without abnormalities.

The heart is of normal size and shape; there is no evidence of cardiac chamber or vascular enlargement. The pulmonary vasculature is within normal limits.

The trachea is normal in diameter and presents the anticipated course. The luminal outline of the trachea is smooth.

The bronchial tree presents with thin walls and tapers uniformly towards the periphery as expected.

The lung parenchyma presents the expected architecture and opacity; the intrapulmonary vascular branching is seen up to the third order lung vessels.

The diaphragm is well delineated with even surface and the expected mild cranial bulging of the diaphragmatic cupola.

Abdomen

The vertebral endplates L7/S1 present moderate spondylosis formation.

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic body and tail are considered normal for position, size, shape and opacity.



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Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

The stomach is in its anticipated position and presents normal content.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

The colon is seen in the expected position and presents with appropriate content.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- Soft tissue opacification right nasal cavity
- Multiple absent teeth
- Normal neck
- Normal thorax
- Normal abdomen

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The soft tissue opacification of the right nasal cavity can be caused by exudate (e.g. rhinitis) or nasal soft tissue mass (e.g. neoplasia, granuloma, cyst). Rhinoscopy including biopsy can be performed as advanced diagnostic tools ± CT study of the skull as advanced imaging modality.
