Reason for Visit: LIMPING History: P IS A 3Y8M OLD INTACT MALE BELGIAN MALINOIS PRESENTING TODAY FOR LIMPING. L FRONT LEG NON WEIGHT BEARING 2 DAYS. O STATES P WOKE UP THAT WAY NO TRAUMA TO O KNOWLEDGE P WAS NORMAL SATURDAY NIGHT O LIVES IN AN APARTMENT NO YARD FOR P TO RUN AROUND. O NOTICED SWELLING TODAY. NO OTHER PROBLEMS/CONCERNS.

Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: CV/Respiratory: Normal heart rate and rhythm, no murmur, pulses strong and synchronous, normal bronchovesicular sounds. EENT: Clear OU and AU. No nasal discharge. No cough on tracheal palpation. Oral cavity: Unable to examine- muzzled Musculoskeletal: BCS = 5/9. Ambulatory x 3. LF paw- moderate to severe swelling on 4th digit, very painful on palpation. Mild moist dermatitis (possible insect bite) on medial aspect of 4th digit. Uro/Perineum: Intact male, 2 descended testicles Abd/GI: Soft, non-painful. No masses or fluid wave palpated Lymph Nodes: No peripheral lymphadenopathy Neurological: Alert and appropriate. No significant abnormalities Skin: Good hair coat. No ectoparasites seen Mentation: BAR Hydration: N

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE LEFT FRONT PAW

Radiographs of the left front paw in two imaging planes are provided for review.

AGE

3 Years, 8 Months

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The fourth phalanx of the left front paw presents with a moderate circumferential homogenous soft tissue swelling. The osseous structures of the fourth digit present without abnormalities.

The remainder of the osseous and soft tissue structures of the left front paw are within normal limits.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The main finding is the soft tissue swelling of the fourth digit of the left front paw and an inflammatory or traumatic origin is considered most likely. There is no evidence of osseous changes.
