



PATIENT PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Buddy Resch Ate rubber piece from toy bone yesterday night. Owner induced vomiting yesterday night by peroxide, but owner could not see rubber piece in vomit. Pet is still eating and drinking well, no vomiting other than when inducing. Need to rule out possible obstruction.

SPECIES RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

Canine Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

BREED Spondylosis formation is seen along the thoracolumbar junction.

Breed German Shepherd X No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin. The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

SEX The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

Male Neutered The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic body and tail are considered normal for position, size, shape and opacity.

AGE Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

INTERPRETED BY The stomach is in its anticipated position and is moderately distended by ingesta.

Dr. med. vet. DipECVDI The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

The colon is seen in the expected position and presents with appropriate content.

REFERRING VET INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

Dr. Medhat Meawad The radiographic study presents without clinically relevant abnormalities. There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material, abnormal gas pattern or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. However, pieces of rubber might be effaced by the material in the stomach. If clinical signs suggestive for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction develop, recommend follow up radiographs of the abdomen.
