



PATIENT PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Cruella Coburn
SPECIES Cruella has been vomiting and having diarrhea. She has bile appearing 2-3 times on Tuesday, vomited food on Thursday. Her diarrhea is liquid. They forced fed her some water in a syringe by mouth yesterday. She was very lethargic on Tuesday, better on Wednesday, worse yesterday but not as bad as at first. She is better today. Cruella vomits up any food eaten, acts interested in food, but seems worse after eating.

Feline
 Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: Cruella has been having decreased energy, appetite, drinking, urination, and having vomiting and diarrhea. The diarrhea is liquid.

BREED RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN

DSH
 Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

SEX
 Spayed
 The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

AGE
 2 Years
 The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

The stomach is in its anticipated position and empty.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

The colon is seen in the expected position and contains a small amount of unformed fecal material.

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The empty gastrointestinal tract is considered as a sequela to the presenting clinical signs. There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. The presumptive diagnosis is gastroenteritis. If not done so yet, recommend complete blood work including fpl to rule out underlying pancreatitis. If clinical signs are refractory to empirical therapy, recommend follow up radiographs or a complete abdominal ultrasound examination; in some cases, a high ileus may lack classical radiographic signs of mechanical obstruction.
