RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE THORAX

BREED

Radiographs of the thorax in three imaging planes are provided for review.

Rottweiler Mix

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

The body condition score is 7/9.

SEX

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

Neutered

The extrathoracic soft tissues present homogeneous without abnormalities.

AGE

8 Years, 3 Months

The heart is of normal size and shape, there is no evidence of cardiac chamber or vascular enlargement. The pulmonary vasculature is within normal limits.

The cranial mediastinum presents the expected soft tissue opacity. The mediastinal width is less than twice the width of the vertebral column at the same level.

INTERPRETED BY

The trachea is normal in diameter and presents the anticipated course. The luminal outline of the trachea is smooth.

The bronchial tree presents with thin walls and tapers uniformly towards the periphery as expected.

The lung parenchyma presents the expected architecture and opacity; the intrapulmonary vascular branching is seen up to the third order lung vessels.

The diaphragm is well delineated with even surface and the expected mild cranial bulging of the diaphragmatic cupola.

The radiographic study of the thorax presents without abnormalities, explaining the described clinical signs. However, a negative radiographic study does not rule out possible underlying bronchitis/tracheitis. Check for signs of laryngeal paralysis as well.

Obesity is also a known predisposing factor for cough and weight management is considered beneficial.
