



PATIENT PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

Cali Parra started coughing daily- video shows a classing bronchitis cough. Pet had labwork recently which was normal. Today she had a normal exam with a mild incr in bv sounds and a short and shallow breathing pattern, though she is very nervous. Her snap BNP is normal. Sending her home with pred and antibiotic. Concern over prominent pericardial silhouette. Pet is on a wt loss regimen and has lost 2 lbs in the last few months. Otherwise doing well.

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE THORAX

Radiographs of the thorax in two imaging planes are provided for review.

BREED

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS

Domestic Short Hair

The body condition score is 8/9.

SEX

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

Spayed Female

The extrathoracic soft tissues present homogeneous without abnormalities.

AGE

The heart is of normal size and shape, there is no evidence of cardiac chamber or vascular enlargement. The pulmonary vasculature is within normal limits.

4 Years

The trachea is normal in diameter and presents the anticipated course. The luminal outline of the trachea is smooth.

INTERPRETED BY

The bronchial tree presents with thin walls and tapers uniformly towards the periphery as expected.

The lung parenchyma presents the expected architecture and generalized mild increased radiopacity; the intrapulmonary vascular branching is seen up to the third order lung vessels.

The diaphragm is well delineated with even surface and the expected mild cranial bulging of the diaphragmatic cupola.

The radiographic study of the thorax presents without abnormalities, but the mild increased radiopacity due to the nutritional status. However, a negative radiographic study does not rule out possible feline bronchial disease.
