



**PATIENT PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS**

Scooter Woodward Vomited two days ago around 10 times, no vomit since then. Diarrhea started in the evening two days ago with some blood, now just diarrhea. Still eating OK. Bright and alert. Not cooperative for physical exam, muzzled. Minimal physical exam due to the temperament. History of eating Kleenex  
**SPECIES** Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: Blood work indicate mild decrease in K, stress glucose, otherwise unremarkable / normal.

**RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN**

Radiographs of the abdomen in three imaging planes are provided for review.

**BREED**

**RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS**

Dachshund Mix

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

**SEX**

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

Neutered Male

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

**AGE**

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic body and tail are considered normal for position, size, shape and opacity.

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

**INTERPRETED BY**

The stomach is in its anticipated position and empty.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

The colon is seen in the expected position and contains a small amount of gas and fecal material in the aboral segment of the descending colon.

**INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS**

The radiographic changes are suggestive for gastroenteritis - e.g. due to dietary indiscretion, parasitic infection, dysbacteriosis, pancreatitis. There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material, abnormal gas pattern or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. If clinical signs are refractory to therapy, recommend follow up radiographs or a complete abdominal ultrasound examination; in some cases a high ileus may lack classical radiographic signs of mechanical obstruction.
