PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS

History: P is an 8 month old Bernese Mountain Dog, male intact. O had recently noted abnormal stance in hindlimbs. He appears to be pronated. No lameness or favoring of hindlimbs. We performed radiographs to evaluate for hip dysplasia and other bony disorders. The tibia (bilaterally) appear to be rotated - considering an angular limb deformity.

RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE PELVIS AND HIND LIMBS**BREED**

Bernese Mtn Dog

A VD projection of the pelvis, craniocaudal and mediolateral view of the stifle joints and dorsoplantar view of the tarsal joints is provide for review. Radiographs are provided in JPEG file format.

RADIOGRAPHIC FINDINGS**SEX**

Male

The osseous and surrounding soft tissue structures of the pelvis – including the coxofemoral joints – are within normal limits.

Both stifle joints present smooth osseous margins. The patella bilaterally is in situ. No abnormalities of the associated soft tissue structures can be appreciated.

AGE

8 Months

The tarsal joints are moderately overexposed and the surrounding soft tissues are burned out. The osseous structures of both tarsal joint are unremarkable.

RADIOGRAPHIC DIAGNOSIS

- Normal coxofemoral joints
- Normal hind limbs

INTERPRETATION OF THE FINDINGS & FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

The radiographic study of the pelvis and hind limbs present without abnormalities. The mild rotation of the tibia is due to projection and no overt angular deformities can be appreciated. Consider physical therapy and regular training to support development of the muscular and ligamentous structures of the hind limbs. If any clinical signs of lameness develop, reevaluating the patient is recommended.
