**PRESENTING CLINICAL SIGNS**

History: Ginny presented to us with multiple vomiting and diarrhea spells. Arrived from Caro, Egypt this Tuesday, but was otherwise fine until today.

Abnormal PE/Chem/CBC/UA Results: dehydration, rectal temperature 40.1 degrees. BW showed dehydration, other parameters are WNL. Normal Cpl and negative 4dx

**RADIOGRAPHIC STUDY OF THE ABDOMEN**

The surrounding bony structures are within normal limits.

**BREED**

Golden Retriever

No abnormalities of the extraabdominal soft tissues are noted. The abdominal wall is smooth and thin.

The serosal detail is maintained throughout the peritoneal and retroperitoneal space.

**SEX**

Female

The liver is appropriate in position, size and presents uniform opacity.

The splenic head is in the anticipated position and within normal limits for size and opacity. The splenic body and tail are considered normal for position, size, shape and opacity.

**AGE**

6 Months

Both kidneys are seen and present with normal size, shape, delineation and opacity. The urinary bladder is in its anticipated position. No radiopaque calculi are noted throughout the upper and lower urinary tract.

The stomach is in its anticipated position and is empty.

The small intestinal loops are of even diameter and non-dilated, a small amount of gas is seen within the small intestinal loops and considered within normal limits.

The colon is seen in the expected position and presents with appropriate content.

The empty gastrointestinal tract in combination with the presenting clinical signs is suggestive for gastroenteritis. There is no evidence of radiopaque foreign material or signs for gastrointestinal mechanical obstruction. If clinical signs are refractory to therapy, recommend follow up radiographs or a complete abdominal ultrasound examination; in some cases, a high ileus may lack classical radiographic signs of mechanical obstruction.
